The half term finished with such a generous donation to the Lewisham Food Bank, made on behalf of our Community by pupils from across the school – much needed support at a time of real crisis for so many.

Now we are into the second half of the Autumn term; the evenings have drawn in and there is a noticeable chill in the air but it is important to know that there is a great deal to look forward to for the whole SMA community. This half term the Academy remembered all those who have fallen in conflicts around the world – including pupils who attended St Joseph's - on Remembrance Day, 11th November.

Advent begins on Sunday, 27th November and St Matthew Academy will be marking this important part of the liturgical calendar, with a school wide charity collection. Year 7 will also be celebrating Mass with the new Episcopal Vicar for Education, Father Victor Darlington, when he visits SMA later this half term. Key Stage 2 and 3 Parent Coffee Morning will take place on 9th December and our Christmas Giving Tree will also be in place from 12th December. The tree is very much the focal point of our Christmas charity collection.

As the Autumn term draws to a close, I hear that there will be a special visitor to our Forest School – Santa Clause is scheduled to visit Key Stage 1 pupils there! Finally, there will be Christmas lunch for the pupils in the closing week of term.

So the usual busy calendar of learning and extracurricular events at school will be augmented by preparations for Christmas. We look forward to welcoming many you at the various events being held here over the course of the next few weeks.

Within our Catholic church community, the month of November is traditionally a time that is dedicated to those who have died. It is sometimes called the month of the Holy Souls and begins with All Saints Day and All Souls Day. We remember our dearly departed by visiting their graves, lighting candles, and praying for them in dedicated masses around the world. The end of November marks the end of the Liturgical year, with a new year beginning on the first Sunday of Advent, the four-week period of preparation before Christmas. The Church has used this period to allow us to focus on the end of all things but to also remind us that we should have hope in the new. The practice of praying for the dead is rooted in Christian belief in the everlasting life promised in Jesus' teachings and foreshadowed by his disciples' experience that God had raised him from the dead. As we go through this month of remembrance, let us pray not only for our dearly departed but for all the souls in purgatory as our prayers express hope that they are freed from any burden of sin and that a place is prepared for them in heaven where we hope to join them one day.

Into your hands, O Lord, we humbly entrust our brothers and sisters. In this life you embraced them with your tender love; deliver them now from every evil and bid them eternal rest. Amen

Book Reviews and Recommendations

Secondary Phase

Nana from Year 8 reviewed 'Look both ways' by Jason Reynolds for our secondary phase.

This book was extremely interesting and funny in some parts. It managed to portray short stories with action and scenes while also embedding problems people may have with poverty, death, grief, cancer, peer pressure and/or more. It is a very informative and generally interesting book and it sends a clear message of the phrase "look both ways" and a recurring theme of a bus falling from the skies. The book links the short stories effectively with recurrent themes/phrases. I would recommend this book to 11-15 year olds as it informs people about personal problems covered in short action packed stories. I rate this book 4 stars out of 5.

Alleyan, Deneise and Joyce from Year 6 reviewed 'The Butterfly Lion' by Michael Morpurgo for KS2.



'The Butterfly Lion' is a book about a boy who was always told to stay in the compound he lived in in South Africa. The main part of the story is about a white lion growing up with the young boy. The boy rescued the white lion from the African bush. The boy loses the lion but eventually finds him again.

We would definitely recommend this book. Children who read the book might find it interesting but also sad at the end. It is an easy read. The book is very gripping from start to finish and the bond between the lion and the boy was very wholesome.

Overall our rating for the book was 3.5 stars out of 5.



Our three year 6 book reviewers also reviewed three pictures books by Michael Rosen for EYFS and KS1.



Joyce read and reviewed 'Owww!'. The book is about a little piglet who loves to move as he sleeps but one day it causes a problem. Alleyan read 'Snore!'. The book is about a dog on a farm with some other animals, but the dog then starts to snore. Everybody tries to make him stop snoring. When he finally wakes up everybody is really tired. I would recommend this book to younger children because it is a bit funny and it might make little one's laugh. I gave it 3 stars out of 5.
