Remembrance Day

Poppy day, or Remembrance Day, is held to remember members of the armed forces who have died in the line of duty, as well as those who have been involved with and affected by war and conflict.

Here at St Matthew Academy we held a number of events to mark the occasion this year. We shared stories of Remembrance and the light bearers led remembrance assemblies.

We also supported the Poppy appeal, by selling merchandise for The Royal British Legion, this was well supported across the school and we would like to extend a big thank you to the pupils, parents and staff who contributed.

SMA held its Remembrance Service in primary and secondary simultaneously where our Catholic pupils remember the souls of the departed. After Mrs Guest's introduction, Monsignor Rthon from St Mary's in Blackheath led our service of remembrance, which was attended by Year 6 and Year 7 classes.

Six pupils volunteered to read poems, including 'In Flanders Field'. Monsignor Rthon, Mr Saunders, a former member of the armed forces laid wreaths alongside Ms Baldwin and our Chair of Governors, Mrs Barber. Mr Charlery and Miss Butterworth played 'The Last Post' to mark the start of our two minute silence followed by the 'Reveille'. The pupils who were unable to join us outside also marked the occasion with poetry, prayer and the 2 minutes of silence in class.

Monsignor Rthon and Ms Baldwin helped us all to reflect on the importance of marking this occasion by reminding us about those who have lost their lives in the First World War and the Second World War, including old boys of St Joseph's and in conflicts which have taken place since.

Secondary News

Geography

Over two mornings in late October the Geography team took all Year 7 pupils on a fieldtrip to Greenwich Park which created much excitement; for most pupils it was their first trip since joining St Matthew Academy. The pupils walked to the park from school and we were fortunate that the weather was kind to us on both days, apart from a light rain shower on one day.



We spent much of the time at the vantage viewing point, next to the Royal Observatory, that offers panoramic views across a large part of central and East London where pupils tried to get a sense of the amazing city they live in. From here we could see such landmarks as the O2, the Shard and the River Thames just beyond the buildings at the bottom of the very steep hill in Greenwich Park that include Queen's House and the Old Royal Naval College. They were asked to sketch the cityscape as well as try to work out the grid references for these landmarks as part of the work they completed. We also learned that the Prime Meridian, which is used to set the time across the globe and splits it between east and west, is located close to where we spent the morning (interestingly, the line also runs right through SMA). We very much hope that the trip will help pupils in their next ranking assessment as they were able to use map and orienteering skills and learn much more about the geography of the area they live in.

It was a fun and enjoyable experience for all; the pupils were well behaved and the staff were happy with the experience of taking Year 7 out on their first of hopefully many trips. We did learn that sadly the deer no longer are in the park, the enclosure was deemed unfit for them (even though there is still a sign pointing towards where it was until recently); they have all been moved to Richmond Park.

Windmill Hill

At the start of November, Year 8 visited PGL, Windmill Hill in East Sussex. In what proved to be one of the wettest weekends of the year, pupils and staff went above and beyond in conquering the elements and enjoying being in the outdoors. Activities included, axe-throwing; Jacob's Ladder; zip-lining and climbing. The staff at Windmill Hill looked after us really well – particularly in the canteen - where there was no shortage of good food to help keep out the cold and rain!



Throughout the weekend, pupils learnt new skills and forged new friendships, which have further strengthened the bond within the Year Group. Ms Skelton and all the staff are very proud of all the children who let their lights shine. Thank you to everyone who took part. We are already looking forward to the next school journey with excitement!

Year 2


This academic year has already been filled with exciting adventures, valuable learning experiences, and notable accomplishments.




LITERACY CORNER

Book Reviews


Theo from year 6 read and reviewed 'A first book of animals' by Nicola Davies and illustrated by Petr Horacek.


Theo also read and reviewed Ajay and the Mumbai Sun by Varsha Shah.




Enkhlen from year 7 reviewed 'The boy behind the wall' by Maximillian Jones.


