Prayer and Reflection

In our gospel this coming Sunday we will hear the parable of the unjust judge and a needy widow. The widow constantly comes before the judge to ask for justice, but he keeps ignoring her. She persists until he is worn down by her. He eventually says to himself, "I don't fear God or care about people, but this woman is driving me crazy. I'm going to see that she gets justice, because she is wearing me out with her constant requests!" The widow gets the justice she was seeking. Jesus explains that if an uncaring, unfit, ungodly judge answers with justice in the end, how much more will a loving and holy Father give what is right to His children?

In our own lives we might be needy like the widow but we do not always get swift justice like her. This does not mean that God does not hear our prayers. He wants us to keep coming to him and to be perpetual in our prayer and faithfulness to him. He is simply asking us to trust Him with our whole selves and to build a relationship with him, because He knows what he wants for us. St Paul's letter to the Thessalonians reiterated this when he wrote "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." At the end of the Gospel reading Jesus asks "But when the Son of Man returns, how many will He find on the earth who have faith?" God wants us to be able to confidently put our hands up and say yes I am the Father's faithful warrior of prayer.

Father in heaven, help me to be like the persistent widow, trusting and giving you my entire self to shape me and use me as you see fit and to stand firm in love and faith. Amen

Secondary News

Computer Science

Year 9 were fortunate enough to have Eugene the creator and founder of Parkopdia visiting over two days. This was an amazing opportunity for pupils to see their subjects in the "real world" and they were so excited to meet an entrepreneur and tech wizard. This was a collaborative project with Business Studies and Computer Science. Eugene created an app called Parkpoedia which allows drivers to find the nearest car park to their destination. It is a smart app which tells the driver whether there is a space available, the route to the car park and the cost. This collaborative project also examined the entrepreneurial risks from a Business Studies point of view as well as from a Computer Science view point with development stages of a software.

Year 8 Pupils have been learning about Computer Systems, how they operate, looking inside the processing units and examining different parts of the computer. We are fortunate to have the old processing units that were removed from our classroom and upgraded, which pupils were able to take apart to see the inside of. They were all fascinated by this and asked many questions about building their own PCs.

Year 11 Pupils have settled in nicely after the summer break and have come back with a positive attitude to learning, they have completed an end of unit

test. The following pupils did extremely well, Kavin, Joel, Micah, Moyin and Nivithan. We are currently studying Networks and how to communicate via them, Mr McKay our in-house IT technician has kindly agreed for the pupils to visit the different switch and server room we

have on site.

Art Design & Technology

It's been a fabulous start to the year, both year 7 and year 8 pupils have fully engaged in the projects, demonstrating excellence in their creative carousel lessons. Year 7 pupils are looking at Art and Design around the world. They have already explored felt making and created their own fabrics from fibre, they have looked at culinary dishes in China and the Caribbean, explored the work of American abstract artists Lee Krasner and produced their own abstract designs. Year 8 pupils have been studying the topic 'Protest and Cause', they have made their own bioplastic in Design and Technology, looked at the work of street artist JR and pop artist Corita Kent. Developed their skills using the sewing machine through practising quilting in the style of artist NedRa Bonds and stencilling like Banksy. Pupils continue to show enthusiasm, whether through demonstrating different artistic skill or making their own homemade burgers and gyozas. It's been an absolute pleasure to see pupils flourish and demonstrate their talents.

This term year 9 pupils in Art and Textiles have been developing a range of mark making techniques. These skills will be used to produce a live piece of art work. Two of our year 9 classes have gained the opportunity to work alongside local artist Dryden Goodwin. The

focus for this project is based on pollution and how this affects us and our community. Both classes have made a wonderful start to their art piece, which will be showcased later on this year.

As always the pupils in St Matthew Academy have made us very proud. The Art Design and Technology team would like to send out a special thank you to our chosen Department Ambassadors, for their support during open evening. Thank you to Tashawna Dunkley, Paris Hanson, Fanta Sheriff, Jade Niles and Jamelia Richards. Well done for actively demonstrating our academy values.


A huge range of primary and secondary books continue to be available to borrow in celebration of Black History Month.

This month, Mrs Fields, the Learning Resource Centre Manager reviewed 'When the sky falls' by Phil Earle for KS3.




During the Second World War, 12-year-old Joseph is sent to stay with his Gran's friend, Mrs F, in the city. Joseph is a very angry boy and Mrs F is a very unfriendly woman. Joseph feels very alone and upset.

Mrs F runs a rundown zoo in the city. However, the city is at the centre of the Blitz where bombs rain down every night. The story is about an unusual friendship which develops between Joseph and a huge silverback gorilla in the zoo, called Adonis.

Alongside this, Joseph has other battles at school, including being bullied and trouble with his reading.

This is a fascinating story about the Second World War from an entirely different perspective, focusing on what happened to these animals in captivity during war time and of course Joseph's journey of self-discovery.

For KS2, the 'Scarlet and Ivy' series of books by Sophie Cleverly is highly recommended.



When troublemaker Scarlet goes missing from Rookwood School her twin sister, Ivy, is invited to 'take her place' in more ways than one. It's not long before Ivy discovers that secrets are rife and the truth has been concealed.

Ivy is determined to solve the mystery of her sister's disappearance, even it that means going up against the terrifying Miss Fox. Even it that means pretending to be Scarlet for as long as it takes.
