What is your role as a Light Bearer? Being a Light Bearer is like being a disciple and sharing the word of God, reading the Bible and praying to God.

Why do you think you make a good Light Bearer? I think I make a good Light Bearer because I praise God and worship him. I read the Bible and know the stories

Jesus told.

Why do you think this role is important to St Matthew Academy? I think the role is important too because you have the job of sharing the word of God with other children.

What impact do you think you have as a Light Bearer? I think I make an impact as a Light bearer by telling stories that show how God will always be with you, like in the story of Jonah. God was with Jonah even when he was in the belly of the whale.

How do you let others let their light shine?

I help others to let their light shine at the school by setting a good example, being helpful and caring and making sure we help each other when we are in need.

What else would you like to do as a Light Bearer? What I would like to do as a Light Bearer is to share the word of God more, to make sure that everyone knows that God will let you into his Kingdom and you will always be guided and protected by him.

What is your role as a Light Bearer?

My role as a Light Bearer is to encourage people and to boost their confidence. It is also to entertain in order to put a message across.

What does your Light Bearer role involve?
We work together to create skits for assemblies and liturgies which help everyone reflect on the readings and how they relate to us as young people. We recently worked on a poem for the Christmas Carol Concert. We also have discussions on different topics for example our 'God given talents'. We also prepare for and lead assemblies.

What impact does being a Light Bearer have on the St Matthew Academy Community?

I think that when people watch me doing assemblies or singing then it might help to boost their confidence and it might give them the confidence to do the same.

How does being a Light Bearer help you?
Being a Light Bearer benefits me outside of school too. I want to do something in the future that will need confidence and it also helps me to spread positive messages through acting and singing.

How do you help others to 'let their light shine'? The Light Bearer buddies will help Year 7 pupils take part in things in school that they might like to do and help to boost their confidence. We also help others to 'let their light shine' by the messages we share in assembly or liturgies for example that you don't need to be scared to do something. Why did you join the Light Bearers?

It was the last day of school and the Light Bearers did a sketch in assembly which inspired me to join.

Why do you like being a Light Bearer?

As a Light Bearer, you learn from others. You might not always be teaching someone else something, they could also be teaching you.

Why did you become a Light Bearer?
In Year 7 Miss Eduvie was our Science

In Year 7 Miss Eduvie was our Science teacher and she said being a Light Bearer was about letting your light shine. She explained the Light Bearers help others through drama, helping them to understand about God in a way that related to them and also have fun.

What do the Light Bearers do? They meet each week and in one week we plan the assemblies we are leading or the liturgies we are leading and the charity events we are involved in and we perform in the liturgies or assemblies. The following week we meet in the Chaplaincy area to learn more about ourselves spiritually through discussions and activities.

How do you help others to 'let their light shine'? Through the Light Bearer Buddies which supports Year 7s who may be struggling to get around school or make friends. To help them engage with school, join clubs and so they know they have a place and feel welcome here.

What impact do the Light Bearers have on the St Matthew Academy community? Light Bearers are role models for younger

Light Bearers are role models for younger pupils. They can help younger pupils to become better people, by demonstrating respect, kindness and how to treat others well. I want to have a positive effect on other people.

Why do you like being a Light Bearer?
We can talk, the Light Bearers are friends.
It's a fun group. I enjoy attending the Light Bearers.



How St Matthew Academy remembered the brave by Mr Rondell Wanza, Assistant Headteacher

At 11.00am on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, the First World War ended. The following year in 1919, King George V declared this would be the date to remember the fallen. The first Remembrance Day was held 90 years ago, when Alan Neill, Member of Parliament for Comox-Alberni, introduced a bill to observe Armistice Day only on November 11. Passed by the House of Commons, the bill also changed the name to "Remembrance Day".

FOR THE FAMILIES who have lost loved ones in war, whether 100 years ago or 10 years ago, they are remembered every day. For those of us who have never been touched by war, then we remember the fallen on this special day.

Regardless of whether we agree with what they were fighting for, or whether we know someone who has died in battle, we must remember that they fought not for themselves, but for all of us, so that we can be free to live and flourish in the kind of world we want for ourselves and future generations.

On Thursday November 11, the Academy commemorated Remembrance Day by holding Remembrance services in the primary playground and at the front of the school, near our war memorial as we do every year.

Monsignor Rothon from St Mary's Church in Blackheath led our service of remembrance which was attended by a Year 6 and Year 7 class. Monsignor Rothon and Mr Wanza helped us all to reflect on the importance of marking this occasion by reminding us about those who have lost their lives in the First World War and the Second World War, including old boys of St Joseph's and in conflicts which have taken place since.

Our youth chaplaincy team The Light Bearers read poems, including In Flanders



Field, beautifully and Mr Charlery played The Last Post to mark the start of our two-minute silence followed by the Reveille. Monsignor Rothon, Mr Saunders, a member of the PE department and former member of the armed forces laid wreaths alongside Ms Baldwin and our Chair of Governors, Mrs Pat Barber. The pupils who were unable to join us outside in the secondary phase also marked the occasion with poetry, prayer and the two minutes of silence from their classrooms while all of the primary children were able to participate in their service in their playground and did so with great respect and reverence.

We will remember them.

2021 WAS QUITE A YEAR for Year 11 student Parfaite. It began with her attending the Speaker's Trust training workshops organised by global charity Jack Petchey along with 21 other Year 10 students. Here she was selected to represent SMA along with students from 249 other UK schools, to take part in the regional finals in June. She went onto win this final with a speech entitled 'Smile and the World Smiles with You.'

This was the third year that SMA bought the cup home at the regionals but what made this achievement even more impressive is the inclusion of schools across Essex as well as London; placing Parfaite among the top 0.2% of young public speakers in London and Essex.

And success for her didn't stop there - of the 187 regional semi-finalists - she was selected as one of the 15 speakers for the Grand Final at the Cambridge Theatre in November speaking to a live audience of more than 500 on a West End stage.

Although, Parfaite did not win the Grand Final, as a result of her amazing achievement in the regional finals, she will be hosting the "Speak Out" Regionals in May this year in the hall at St Matthew Academy. We are looking forward to welcoming student speakers from 16 schools in the South East London area.

Then followed a session in the sports hall where the group took part in a host of physical and skill related practical activities by Mr Akin Goksel, Associate Assistant Headteacher

SPORTING SUPERSTAR Orlan Jackman lives in South London but his roots are in East London – he was born and raised in Hackney and went to Homerton Boys school (now City Academy), which has a strong reputation for sporting brilliance.

His first passion, like many boys, was football and he didn't play basketball seriously until he was in year 10. His rapid rise in the sport took him to America where he earned a sports scholarship in basketball at Oklahoma City University. Standing at 6'7", Orlan first turned professional in 2012 and he can play in a variety of on court positions including Small Forward, Shooting Guard and Power Forward. His professional career has seen him play in Germany, Portugal and the UK where he has played in the top British Basketball League (BBL) for a host of clubs across the country. This has included London teams; London City Royals and London Lions and he has won the BBL Cup for three consecutive seasons, becoming the first player to achieve such a feat. His success did not stop at club level as he has represented Great Britain on the International stage as well as England at the Commonwealth Games in Sydney, Australia.

In between sessions we caught up with Orlan to to ask him some quick-fire questions. What motivated you to become a sportsperson? I wanted to help people who were like me when I was growing up, so I made a platform for myself to be able to do that. How would you describe yourself as a player? Hardworking, I'm a team player. What mental tool do you use under pressure? Deep breathing and thinking about

all the times I have done something right.

What are your three biggest achievements
in life? My family, I have an active one-yearold son who keeps me busy! And of course,
playing for Great Britain and representing
England at the Commonwealth Games.

Who is your favourite sports hero?

Away from basketball, what do you do to relax? I hang out with my family and help future athletes develop through my mentoring company.

coaches, athletes and your teachers. They will help and guide you towards making the right decisions in your careers. It's not easy and it takes a lot of sacrifice.
