Media Trip

We were really pleased to be able to take 20 of our Year 10 Film Studies and HPA pupils to central London for the day, to work with FTI Consultancy, a firm that deals with the media and its influence on modern society. The opportunity was offered to us by Young Citizens, a national charity aimed at providing education for young people to become informed citizens of the future, and meant that pupils would work directly with professionals. The workshop took place in the plush environs of FTI Consultancy in Aldersgate, next to the Museum of London, with panoramic views of the city from the 9th floor, including the sight of Lewisham in the distance. Throughout the day the pupils were well looked after with access to drinks and snacks and got to experience what It might feel like to work in this sort of environment in the future.



Pupils worked in small groups alongside the consultants from FTI, looking at issues on the changing nature of the media, how to spot fake news and bias and keeping the media in check. The interactive nature of the activities engaged pupils and encouraged them to share their ideas. It gave pupils the opportunity to critically think about the different platforms they rely on for news and interaction. They then had discussions, asked and answered questions using resources that explored a timeline of the history of media up to the present, and reflected on its more recent developments and the impact it has on people and how they access information and where they get their news from.



It was really good to see pupil presentations on how to spot fake news, what sanctions could be used to tackle this and why it happens. Pupils learned how fake news can be potentially identified through spelling and grammar errors, exaggerated headlines and where else the story gets broadcast to verify status. Pupils were able to make links with subjects they have studied such as the use of propaganda by the Nazis in the 1930s or the events in the USA in January 2021. They learned that views expressed are often personal and not based on facts, there is no such thing as bad publicity and our responsibility to check whether stories are true or not by being aware of the motivation of influencers on platforms such as Facebook or YouTube. Such stories tend to sensationalise and manipulate people, examples looked at included conspiracy theories linking the use of 5G technology to the outbreak of Covid or Trump's advice to people to avoid catching Covid. Pupils know that people are gullible and we need to check the authenticity of stories on the internet and cross reference with other sources and look at the comments people post.



The pupils also had a go at writing their own version of fake news stories on the shampoo scandal to demonstrate what they had learned.



Pupils really enjoyed the experience and welcomed the opportunity to learn about the media. D'Angelo said he had learned lots and 'working with the mentors was really helpful' and he 'learned how to communicate with adults'. D'Metri said it helped him to be more critical of the media and to realise 'that there is often more than one side to any story' and that the 'news is not necessarily the whole truth' and he would be more critical of what he views online in the future. Georgia said she enjoyed doing the presentations best and that it 'was good to share your own opinions and hear others.

Our pupils created quite an impression with the consultants they worked with; this was the first time in two years that they were able to do the workshop in person and we hope that it will lead to more opportunities for pupils in the future especially our Media scholars.



Book Reviews

Our year 7 team reviewed 'Race to the Frozen North' by Catherine Johnson.



'Race to the Frozen North' was a very adventurous story and the fact that it's non-fiction makes it even more engaging. Matthew Henson, also known as Matt, was a Black American who lost his parents when he was young. He then got adopted by a vicious woman, Nellie, who beat him twice as much as she beat his sisters. That's how Matt became a runaway from home and decided that his future would be to travel the world by boat and explore the seas.

Matthew will experience the joy of being accepted by who he is and the thrill to live beneath the deck on a ship. However, Henson will also face many challenges due to his race and colour. So when Matthew and his dear colleague, Captain Peary, are the first men to reach the North Pole, Matt is thrilled to have made it there. On the other hand, will America acknowledge his achievements or will they ignore him because of the colour of his skin?



I really liked this book because it shows the definition of perseverance and determination. It also shows that those from ethnic minorities did not get the praise they deserved. Matthew and his team had to try this expedition more than twenty times which determines the aspect of endurance as they never gave up. This novel would be even better if it was written in more detail and showed sketches of pictures of all the adventures that Matthew Henson had been through.

It was easy to read and suitable for KS3 readers with a younger reading age. I would recommend this book.



This month our Year 6 reviewers reviewed two picture books by the author Tracey Corderoy for EYFS and KS1.

'The Boy and the Bear' is about a boy who wanted a friend to play with. All the best games he wanted to play needed two people, like catch and hide-and-seek. He then came across a big blue bear who started sending him messages on a paper boat. At first the boy was unsure but then he started playing all his favourite games with the bear, but the bear couldn't play the boy's games with him. He didn't understand hide-and-seek and he was too heavy for the see-saw. The bear then built a beautiful tree house and the boy and bear had a wonderful time in the tree house until winter came and it was time for the bear to hibernate. The boy missed the bear terribly until the spring when he came out of hibernation. The boy was so happy to see the bear again! I would recommend this book to year 1 pupils and I give it 4.4 stars out of 5.



'Why?' is about a curious rhino who is always asking questions about everything. He asks questions like 'Why does toast make crumbs?' and 'Why do dropped things go smash?' His Mum and Dad then decide to take him to a museum as they are tired with all his questions but then he has more questions than ever! The only time he stopped asking questions was when he was asleep. I think that EYFS children will really enjoy this book.
