Connect with your child in everyday ways!



Brilliant Club Launch Event

We were delighted to take 14 of our Year 9 pupils to the launch for this year's Brilliant Club Scholars Programme. The Brilliant Club aims to raise the aspirations of pupils from state schools to consider applying for top universities in the UK so we were fortunate that pupils could visit Brasenose College, University of Oxford.

The day was hosted by the Brilliant Club and pupils were given a brief talk about university life before going on their guided and extensive tour of Brasenose College. Current students from the college showed many parts of the college and explained how Oxford University operates; they saw student accommodation, leisure facilities available and the social opportunities open to students. The pupils were also shown around the centre of Oxford including the famous Radcliffe Camera, part of the Bodleain library where some of the Harry Potter movies were filmed.

We are once again, incredibly excited about the programme and fully expect to build on the success of the last three years with all pupils completing the final assignment and successfully passing the course.







Business Events

Year 9 pupils were visited by a local entrepreneur -Eugene Tsyrklevich, founder and CEO of Parkopedia. Pupils were able to hear how the business idea came about and the risks and struggles that Eugene encountered.



Year 10's started their year with a visit from the Bank of England. Pupils were able to look at the role of the Bank of England on economic policy and ask questions about the day to day running of this institution. Their learning will be further supported by a visit to FTI Consulting in June. Then at the beginning of this year Year 10's went to Chelsea FC, to attend "The business of football" workshop. Pupils were treated to a tour of the stadium, had a chance to host a media interview post match and explore all the decision making that goes hand in hand with running a major sports club.



Last week Year 10 completed their Mosaic Enterprise Challenge run by the Princes Trust. This is a nationwide competition held every year, where pupils run a business online and the top scoring teams compete in a final held in London for prizes. 

Alleyan, Joyce and Deneise from Year 6 reviewed three books from the Agent Zaiba Investigates series by Annabelle Sami.



Alleyan read 'The Smuggler's Secret'. This book is about a school trip to see a shipwreck. Zaiba goes along with her best friend Poppy and her brother Ali to identify the mystery artefact found in the shipwreck. But then the artefact goes missing and so Zaiba has to start using her investigative skills. This book is suitable for children in years 3 and 4. I would recommend this to someone who likes investigation. I gave this book 3.5 stars out of 5.

Summarised in three words, Nisha's War is hopeful, mysterious and emotional. These three characteristics combined together make an excellent story. This book contains drama, suspense, friendship and historical content. The story talks about how Nisha conquers her fears in memory of her loved ones, makes new friends at the loneliest of times.

Nisha is a young Anglo-Indian girl who lives in Malaya. She flees the Japanese invasion with her parents and goes to live on a haunted island off the coast of England with her Grandma. People judge the new arrivals due to their skin colour. What we enjoyed most about this story is how it uses the technique of delayed revelation. We really liked reading it since it gave us knowledge about Malaya during World War Two. This book beautifully mixes in the concepts of family relationships, world war, fear, as well as spiritual revelations. Overall, Nisha's war was a breath-taking book which reveals the wretched and wicked life of people during the second world war. But as Nisha's grandmother always says, "You must always have hope." Overall this book was an interesting read and we highly recommend it to those over the age of 11.
