Together We Are Stronger!

On May 25th, the world quickly became aware of an unspeakable crime perpetrated in the city of Minneapolis. Yet again news had emerged that a young black man was the tragic victim of unprovoked police brutality— a crime which sadly, we are becoming all too accustomed to hearing about. George Floyd had become the latest victim of violently aggressive policing, just because of the colour of his skin.

This situation is not confined to one side of the Atlantic. We have seen similar instances of unfair and violent policing meted out to people of colour here too. Racism is still an every day occurrence for so many people in our city and very likely in our school community. Therefore it is totally understandable that there is anger and frustration that, yet again, a so called civilised nation has failed to deal with this most evil of social issues. From the tragic murder of Stephen Lawrence and the incompetent and inadequate investigation that followed, to the scandalous mistreatment of the Windrush Generation by government, to the complete absence of a duty of care shown by the authorities towards families living in the Grenfell Tower at the time of the fire: every day racism continues to pervade society.

Black lives matter. We at St Matthew Academy know this. We are a strong community and our strength comes from the values which we live and work by. We have faith. In the days, weeks and months ahead we must talk about what has happened. We all must work towards ensuring the system we work by truly reflects equality and justice for our community, and in turn, all people. We will stand for justice and equality for as long as it takes for it to be our reality. We have learnt so much from what has gone before; we understand that many in our police force do support our community and do a fine job despite being let down by some unscrupulous officers and a system biased against people of colour. St Matthew Academy understands the value of this community. We aim for this to be shown in our demonstration of value for democracy, individual liberty, tolerance and mutual respect. We work to uphold justice and the true letter of the law for people of every ethnicity and faith as well as those who do not adhere to any faith.

The brief

Construct a boat to support up to 250g without sinking.

The method

- Draw out the basic shape of your boat on the cardboard, and cut it out.
- 2. Create walls for your boat from more cardboard.
- Stick the bottom of the boat and the walls together with tape or glue.
- Back everything with wax paper or foil be careful not to leave any gaps where the water can get in.
- 5. Place the 250g weight in the boot.
- 6. Set your boat afloat.

Top tip

Think about stability. Some shapes are more stable than others when a load is applied.



Where a boot is placed in water, it displaces an amount of water equal to the boot's weight - as long to the object is loss dense than the value, it will found.

Respond and Request

Set aside 10-15 minutes and create a suitable environment by removing any distractions. Make sure that you are comfortable. Perhaps light a candle. Make the sign of the cross † and remain still for a minute of settling silence. Call to mind the love that God has for you. Remember that through this scripture our Lord is truly present. Then read the Gospel, preferably aloud and slowly, and pay attention to any words that stand out. If any do, meditate on them for a few minutes and be invited into a dialogue with God.

Taken from the Gospel for Sunday 7th June 2020 - God so Loved the World (John 3:16-18)

Jesus said to Nicodemus, 'God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but whoever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son.'

Martin Niemöller was a German Lutheran pastor and theologian born in Lippstadt, Germany, in 1892. Niemöller was an anti-Communist and supported Adolf Hitler's rise to power at first. But when Hitler insisted on the supremacy of the state over religion, Niemöller became disillusioned. He became the leader of a group of German clergymen opposed to Hitler. In 1937 he was arrested and eventually confined in Sachsenhausen and Dachau. He was released in 1945 by the Allies. He continued his career in Germany as a clergyman and as a leading voice of penance and reconciliation for the German people after World War II.

It is everyone's responsibility to stand up against social injustice.

What is Pentecost?



Pentecost is regarded as the birthday of the Christian church. Pentecost is the festival when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is celebrated on the Sunday 50 days after Easter (the name comes from the Greek pentekoste, "fiftieth"). It is also called Whitsun but does not necessarily coincide with the Whitsun Bank Holiday in the UK.

Pentecost is regarded as the birthday of the Christian church, and the start of the church's mission to the world.

The Holy Spirit is the third part of the **Trinity** of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit that is the way Christians understand God.

Celebrating Pentecost

Pentecost is a happy festival. Ministers in church often wear robes with red in the design as a symbol of the flames in which the Holy Spirit came to earth.
