Prayer and Reflection







Catholic World News

Today's Gospel in Art - My words will never pass away

Gospel of 27th November 2020 - Luke 21:29-33

Jesus told his disciples a parable: 'Think of the fig tree and indeed every tree. As soon as you see them bud, you know that summer is now near. So with you when you see these things happening: know that the kingdom of God is near. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away.'

Reflection on the precious stone inset Sacramentary

Our Gospel reading today ends with Jesus's words 'my words will never pass away'. This mirror's the example we are looking at: The Berthold Sacramentary, which is named after Berthold, the abbot of Weingarten from 1200-1232, who commissioned it. It is one of the most luxurious German manuscripts and a major monument of Romanesque art.

The book still retains its original tooled metal and precious stone inset binding, which includes representations of the abbey's patron saints (Martin and Oswald) and Abbot Berthold himself. Not many treasure-bound manuscripts, whether Gospel or

Pope Francis: 'The Church is the work of the Holy Spirit'

In his address on 25th November, the Pope said that the four fundamental qualities were present in the early Church as described in the Book of Acts. They were listening to the apostles' teaching, the safeguarding of mutual communion, the breaking of the bread, and prayer.

"Any situation needs to be evaluated in the light of these four coordinates. Whatever is not part of these coordinates lacks ecclesiality, it is not ecclesial," he said.



"It is God who creates the Church, not the clamour of works. The Church is not a market; the Church is not a group of businesspeople who go forward with a new business. The Church is the work of the Holy Spirit whom Jesus sent to us to gather us together."

In his audience address, the pope continued his cycle of catechesis on prayer, which he began in May. Speaking via livestream from the library of the Apostolic Palace due coronavirus restrictions, he noted that the first Christians did not neglect prayer, even though they were "on the move." He continued to state "We find here four essential characteristics of ecclesial life: listening to apostles' teaching, first; second, safeguarding of mutual communion; third, the breaking of the bread; and fourth, prayer."
